Metro Blooms 2015 Formal Garden Award:

4753 Vincent Ave S by Metro Blooms

When Steve and Marsha Cusulos moved into Fulton in 1976, it was a different landscape from what we see today. Not only was their own yard rather sparse and barren (except for a couple of large trees), the neighborhood itself was more turf-centric and less filled with flower gardens. Although they deny starting the trend, they did immediately start transforming their yard into the beautiful formal garden Minneapolis residents now enjoy.



Steve and Marsha described their search for a "classic" home, and their delight upon finding the Palladian home at 4753 Vincent Ave S. They believe that a house should be consistent in style both inside and out, and have therefore carefully selected period furnishings inside and created a formal garden outside.



Marsha grew up gardening "by force," pulling out dandelions with a table knife, but explains that she now finds weeding therapeutic. Steve also came to the task by helping his family, and now spends a great deal of time doing some of the hardscaping (he put in their patio and driveway himself), planting and transplanting. While Marsha is fairly conservative and deliberately plans her gardening, Steve is more likely to just "go with it." The combination seems to work, as they have together planned and created a beautiful oasis with endless items to catch the eye and peaceful places to just sit and enjoy the environment. They describe their garden as a "museum garden," with small galleries and "discovery"

spaces," and have left it open (they took out a privacy fence decades ago) so that people can enjoy it from the street. They explain that "if we weren't outside working, we wouldn't have gotten to know the people we do."

Steve and Marsha invite you to stop by and take a look. "We are on a busy walking route to Lake Harriet and have the opportunity to visit with passers by when we are out working, which is any day when it is not raining or snowing."
