Park Center Theater in March, allowing them an opportunity to be exposed to the Twin Cities' art, theater and history cultures.

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
Fulton Zoning Committee is Here to Help

The Fulton Zoning Committee exists to advise Fulton Neighborhood Association (FNA) on applications for zoning variances within the boundaries of Fulton Neighborhood and to provide a forum for neighbors in that process. The Committee receives notice of each variance request, discusses it during its monthly meeting, and makes a site visit to visually inspect the property in question. Then it recommends to FNA to "oppose" or "not oppose" the request; the final decision rests with FNA as the committee is advisory only.

When a variance is requested, the property owner is required by the city to notify all other nearby properties within 350 ft. of the request. If you receive notice of a neighbor's variance request, we would love to hear your feedback so that we understand all viewpoints and can make the most informed recommendations. To provide feedback, property owners can e-mail the committee at zoning@fultonneighborhood.org.

The Zoning Committee would also be happy to speak with a property owner before the variance request is made in order to clarify the process. Meetings occur about once a month on Mondays at 6:30 p.m. at Pershing Park. Email zoning@fultonneighborhood.org to inquire about the next available meeting time.

The City of Minneapolis "Land Use and Zoning Overview" explains variances as well as rezoning and conditional use permits and is available online. If you believe your project may require a zoning variance, contact the Fulton Zoning Committee zoning@fultonneighborhood.org.

Metro Blooms 2015 Best Alley Garden Award:

4805 Drew Ave S by Metro Blooms

Second in a two-part series

When Mary Lynn McPherson moved into her house on Drew Ave 18 years ago, she says she knew nothing about gardening. Looking at her yard now, one would never guess that was the case. This home's yard is full of surprises around every bend. From the front of the house, there is no clue to the spectacular view from the back.



The house is built into a hill, and as one rounds the house around to the back yard, the sloping backyard and its many terraced levels gracefully curve down to the alley garden at the bottom. The alley garden does not have a clear demarcation between it and the rest of the backyard. From the alley, one sees a unique blend of structure and meandering curves, inspired by Asian design. An informal series of bamboo-slatted fences – meant for architectural interest, not privacy – separate the alley garden from the backyard gardens. Structure is provided by yew hedges, and there are curves of small garden pods, which are surrounded by copper rings, each providing a sort of formal structure, but without sharp lines of typical formal

gardens. Each pod features a type of plant or ground cover, such as pachysandra, wild geraniums, and nasturtium. Several of these pods are along the alley itself.

Mary expresses her admiration and gratitude to the landscaper who designed these gardens years ago, and who continues to advise and inspire her to see this yard as a work in progress. His name is Stephen Kung, of Urban Oasis Landscaping, and his design, along with Mary's ingenuity for getting the work done efficiently, is an inspiration indeed. The basic bones of the yard were there when she moved in 18 years ago, such as the stone wall terraced areas, but they were being choked out by overgrown vinca and other plants. Mary dug out this overgrowth by hand so she could begin with a clean slate. Stephen not only provided the design but gave her the idea of having a Garden Party, where friends came and helped install the garden. She advises that this is an excellent way to save some money on costly professional installations while having fun with friends. People learn from each other, bouncing gardening ideas around, and she highly recommends this and would do it again this way in a heartbeat. Throughout the years, Stephen has become a teacher, mentor and friend.

Each level of the garden, starting with the alley, has its own feel, ranging from flowering plants to slate walking paths surrounded by moss to a terrace with pea gravel and large stones inspired by Zenlike Asian gardens. The copper theme of the rings surrounding the mini-garden areas is repeated in the copper stones used to keep the water draining out of the downspout away from the house; copper is also reflected in the bark of amur cherry trees.

Mary said the challenges of weeding have become less over the years. It took time and dedication to replace weeds with groundcovers such as creeping jenny. Bunnies have been an issue



and Mary is constantly looking for natural ways to deter them from devouring her hostas. An irrigation system has been helpful at keeping everything healthy as well.

Through the years, Mary has learned much about gardening. She's accustomed to trial and error. Mary doesn't believe in privacy fences and loves sharing her garden with friends and neighbors, who must be thrilled with the opportunity to see such loveliness as they stroll down what could be just an ordinary alley!
