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A Community Dialogue with Minneapolis Police Leadership

On Mon., Feb. 26, approximately 75 southwest Minneapolis residents gathered at Pershing Park to meet Minneapolis Police Chief Medaria Arradondo and 5th Precinct Inspector Kathy Waite. The meeting, co-hosted by Council Member Linea Palmisano and Fulton Neighborhood Association, allowed neighbors to ask questions, make comments and speak with our leaders one-on-one. Neighbors learned the personal story and background of our new police chief and our inspector, and about their vision for improving safety across the city.

Topics discussed varied, but most questions and comments were focused on the office-involved shooting in Fulton in July, 2017, rebuilding trust, body-worn cameras and the wellness of the department's sworn officers and civilians.

Chief "Rondo," as he prefers to be called, noted the profound impact an officer-involved shooting has on a community. The police department's ultimate goal is to find out what happened and to bring justice for all involved. They are uncomfortable with the lack of control, lack of information, and the length of the criminal investigation, but fully support allowing the criminal justice system to play out in such a way that the truth is discovered while protecting the civil rights of all involved. The chief noted that there are still tough times ahead as the community grapples with healing. He will focus additional efforts on accountability and procedural justice.

The MPD knows that it needs to rebuild trust in order to establish strong communities and relationships. Some neighbors expressed their fear of police and others their anger that the body-worn cameras were not being used on the evening of the shooting. An internal audit of the entire department conducted after the shooting incident showed that cameras were not being used in the manner and amount that they were intended. A new policy has been put in place and compliance has increased, but not to desired levels. The city is working on an even more robust body-worn camera policy and recognizes that it will evolve because it is a new technology for MPD to implement.

Inspector Waite highlighted the impact that policing has on officer wellness. The department does a pre-employment screening that focuses on not only physical and emotional status, but also implicit bias, cultural competency, etc. All of these factors impact the overall fitness of an officer. Stress reducing activities like yoga and other wellness-based opportunities are now being offered. This has been a huge cultural shift in the way the department supports its officers.

Other topics discussed included pedestrian safety, traffic enforcement, police interactions with residents with a disability, excessive force and best practices seen in other departments around the country.


Southwest High School Spotlight Musical RENT

2018 Fulton Small Grants Recipients

Fulton Neighborhood Association is in its fourth year of providing funding for local programming through the Fulton Small Grants Program. The program is designed to support community engagement and neighborhood youth activities. We are proud to announce the recipients of the 2018 Fulton Small Grants:



Southwest First Technology Challenge (FTC) Award Amount: \$1,095

The Southwest FTC program was created to make FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) robotics available to middle school students and fills the gap between existing elementary school Lego Robotics programs and high school FIRST Robotics Challenge (FRC) robotics programs. FTC teams design, build, program, and operate robots to compete in a head-to-head challenge in an alliance format.

Grant funds will allow for the purchase an official FTC competition field. This portable 12 x 12 ft. field will make it easier to prepare for robotics competitions as well as host robot competitions and demonstrate this robotics program to the Community.

Lake Harriet Community School Lower Campus S.T.E.A.M. Activities (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math) Award Amount: \$1,243.22

The S.T.E.A.M. Program will bring engineering experience to students. Young children have a fascination with both building things and taking them apart – making them natural engineers. While doing this, they use math and science skills and see how they are relevant to their lives. Hands-on, project-based learning is the essence of engineering.

Grant funds will be used to purchase a Lego wall, Plus-Plus Blocks to build 3D structures and shapes and Keva planks. The students will explore structures and stability and determine what makes them stronger, more efficient and stable. The building tools will be available not only to LHLC students, but also the after-school program.

Southwest High School Wellness Club Award Amount: \$1,100

This new club will meet weekly to learn about mental health and cultivate a culture of wellness at SWHS, proactively addressing wellness from multiple angles, including environmental, social-emotional, and racial consciousness. This club will affect not only the high school itself but the whole neighborhood as more and more research shows that emotional health is the underpinning of any healthy community. Offering SWHS students an empowering framework and approach they can use and share with their world could have a significant impact not only on Fulton but beyond.

Grant funds will be used to plan, coordinate and conduct approximately 20 club meetings.

Lake Harriet Community School Upper Campus Safety Patrol Support Award Amount: \$500

The mission of the Lake Harriet Safety Patrol Program is to keep the children of Lake Harriet Upper Campus and the immediate community safe when walking across crosswalks that surround school before and after-school hours. The Safety Patrol Program fosters a positive school climate with the goal of involving all students who want to participate and retaining their participation for the entire school year. A longer-term goal is to train younger students and incent participating students to return to safety patrol the following year.

Grant funds will be used for program coordination, monthly meetings, badges, certificates, bulletin boards and a visit from University of Minnesota mascot, Goldy Gopher.
