3 Ways to Become an Ally

1. **Listen.** Listen to what marginalized people are saying. Leave any preconceived notions at the door and actively listen to what others are experiencing – whether it's face-to-face, in what you read or on social media. It's not about you, your feelings or opinions; it's about hearing theirs.

2. **Speak up**. Stand up and speak out when you hear something hateful or ignorant. Let your voice be heard even when it feels terrifying.

3. **Stay focused.** Keep the conversation centered on voices and experiences of the black, Indigenous and people of color communities.

Spotlight on Fulton: Overdressed Duo

Spotlight on Fulton features the unique people and places of Fulton neighborhood.

Spring 2020 was the season when the music stopped. Fulton resident Elizabeth Chua and her friend, Carole Schultz, could not bear to give up their music despite the pandemic and Stay at Home orders. Both professional musicians, they still needed to feed their musical souls and this summer they took matters into their own hands and formed Overdressed Duo. The name comes from a quote by Oscar Wilde, "You can never be overdressed or overeducated." This description fits both women well, as they loved school and also love to get dressed up and perform.

Elizabeth, a pianist, grew up in Malaysia before moving to Middle Tennessee State University for her master's, then to the University of Minnesota for her



doctoral studies. Elizabeth noted that she traded Tennessee for Minnesota because "I wanted to experience snow" and is happy to call Minnesota home now. Originally from Burnsville, Carole, a vocal soprano, trained at the University of St. Thomas and the University of Minnesota, where the two first met and have now become best friends. Elizabeth and her husband bought their home in Fulton about a year ago because of its proximity to the lakes and 50th & France. Carole, who lives in the Seward neighborhood, spends so much time at Elizabeth's house that they consider her an honorary Fulton resident.

In July 2020, Overdressed Duo began performing socially distanced "Tiny Lawn Concerts" in Elizabeth's front yard at 49th and Drew. Elizabeth mentioned it to a neighbor and, in just two days, word spread and their first concert was a success. The concerts average an audience of around 20 people and are 30 minutes in length. Overdressed Duo performs a variety of selections from operas, musical theater, folk and spirituals, with a little Disney for the kids. The selections are recognizable classics so that everyone can embrace the performance. Given the popularity of the series, they have invited some of their fellow musicians to join them, bringing in different voice types for more volume and opening up their selections to duets and trios.

With National Night Out canceled this year, the duo held a concert on that date, joined by two friends, soprano Carmelita Guse and baritone John Allen Nelson. The concert included songs from *Wicked*, *The Music Man*, *Susannah*, *The Magic Flute*, and popular songs like "Shenandoah" and "Danny Boy." Beautiful music floated along Drew Avenue, drawing passersby, dog-walkers, and bicyclists to stop and listen.

Fulton's music lovers can look forward to the joy of more live music. Save the date for the next big show: Tues., Sept. 15 at 6:30 p.m. near the intersection of 49th & Drew. They will have shorter pop-up shows in the meantime that they will announce on their Facebook page,

Elizabeth and Carole plan to continue their shows until it is too cold to perform outdoors and are hoping to make this music series an annual summer tradition in Fulton neighborhood.
