# **Fulton's Phase II NRP Planning**

#### Planning Process Culminates in February

At the beginning of 2003, FNA chartered a Neighborhood Revitalization Program (NRP) Steering Committee to plan for a second allocation of neighborhood improvement funding. The funding allocation, although still uncertain in its size due to city budget cuts, will soon become available to neighborhoods who have completed most of their NRP Phase I projects. The planning process in Fulton included reviewing projects implemented through Phase I, completing a neighborhood survey, holding focus groups, and researching the potential for creating new projects and continuing successful ones.

With at least a 51% requirement to spend funds on housing-related projects, Fulton focused much of its planning efforts to assess neighborhood attitudes toward housing. The Housing Committee formed to manage this task implemented a random sample survey to learn what neighbors think about urban housing issues in Fulton. The input received from this process will be used to shape the Phase II housing projects and will soon be available to the public.

After a draft Phase II Action Plan is developed, neighbors will have an opportunity to weigh in with their opinion on the funding allocations and priorities laid out in the plan. # **Southwest High School Parking**

#### Plan to Address Neighbor Concerns

Over the last few years, both the City and Southwest High School have heard an increasing number of concerns from neighborhood residents about accessing their homes due to the number of cars parked on their streets by school users (e.g., teachers, students, parents and community education participants). A task force was created consisting of residents, Minneapolis Public Works staff, Council Member Barret Lane's office, Community Education staff and Southwest High School management and students. After months of discussion, adjustments, alternate plans, meetings with neighbors and re-examination of neighborhood parking, the task force finalized a proposal.

Residents immediately surrounding the school are being asked to participate in a permit parking zone to ensure that school visitors are spread more evenly throughout the neighborhood. This will be a two-tier plan. Tier 1 would include Abbott, Beard, Chowen and Drew on streets 46th—48th Streets. Tier 2 will have the option of choosing permit parking after evaluating the impact of Tier 1. This tier includes Ewing and Zenith from 45th to 48th Streets, along with the 4500 blocks of Abbott, Beard, Chowen and Drew.

After the New Year, petitioners will visit homes on designated Tier 1 blocks to ask residents to consider signing the petition in support of permit parking. If 75% support is garnered, the request will be submitted to the City for approval by the City Council. The City is not setting a timeline or deadline for implementing Tier 2, since it cannot predict if parking behavior will change to necessitate the need for Tier 2.

The task force feels this proposal is an appropriate approach to addressing the issue of school-related parking, while taking the concerns of all residents into consideration.
