The 2008 BLEND Award Jurors were Ashley Mitlyng, Acacia Architects, LLC; Eric J. Hansen, AIA; and Patrick Mackey, Mackey Malin Architects. Many thanks to the jurors for their participation.

BLEND stands for Buildings and Landscapes Enhancing the Neighborhood through Design. The name and the award represent Fulton residents' recognition of interest in their neighborhood and encouragement of progress while balancing a need for compatibility with existing residences. 'Blend' is a word we hear often as people talk about how they'd like new construction to fit into their neighborhoods.

The award reinforces design guidelines written by FNA's zoning committee in March 2007 which also mirror changes to the Minneapolis Zoning Code sponsored by Councilmember Betsy Hodges' to curtail the most criticized practices of builders.

A Letter from Council Member Betsy Hodges

Greetings, Fulton neighbors!

As fall approaches, a couple of important things are happening at the City I'd like to let you know about. The Mayor recently announced his proposed budget, and the Council will be making decisions about the future of neighborhood funding and governance.

The budget is the most important piece of policy I work on as a Council Member. My foundation is a budget based on principles. That means making sure that our budget is structurally balanced, that we're paying off our debt responsibly and vigorously, and that we are making decisions within our stated financial policies. All fiscal decisions, both regarding taxes and expenditures, are built upon that solid foundation.

As we set the levy this year, I am mindful of the pressure residents are feeling in their property tax bills. In an era of reduced state aid and increased need, when the City's budget has been cut to the bone so much we are now simply cutting bone, it is nonetheless important to find ways to responsibly ease the property tax burden on neighbors.

Once those questions are answered, it then becomes a series of decisions about where we as a City should be spending the dollars we *do* have.

When I met with the Mayor this year about my priorities as he was putting his budget together, I told him the same thing I told him last year when we met: investment in our infrastructure is crucial at this time in Minneapolis' history. Our budget has been so stretched in the last six years that only now is the stretched-out timeline for street maintenance becoming painfully evident. We must maintain our commitment to the public safety dollars we've committed in recent years, but now it is time to turn our attention to the basic needs of public works. In addition, as a member of the NRP Working Group, I think it's crucial that we find funding for neighborhoods beyond 2009.

The NRP Workgroup, on which I serve, presented our final recommendations to the Council on July 24th, in the form of a document called the Framework for the Future. The Framework addresses key issues regarding administration, governance, and funding of an on-going neighborhood revitalization program. Key features are a new City department to administer all of the City's community engagement efforts, a new Neighborhood and Community Advisory Board, and two new funds for discretionary neighborhood spending in addition to basic dollars for neighborhoods to use for their own administrative needs.

I hope you all are having a great summer. Feel free to call my office if you need anything, and I look forward to seeing you at the Fulton Festival in September!
