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Standing Tall in Fulton Tina Smith, Political Organizer

At home with husband Archie, sons, 15 year old Sam and 13 year old Mason, and their Bernese Mountain Dog Charlie, Tina Smith passionately lives her beliefs through political organizing. Most recently, Tina found herself playing a role in history when she became campaign manager for Vice President Walter Mondale's six-day senate campaign following the death of Senator Paul Wellstone.

With a background in marketing and business, Tina was a partner in a national political strategy firm from 1994 to 1999, when she resigned to stay closer to home and focus on Minnesota politics and community issues. In the course of her career, she developed a relationship with Vice President Mondale. When Mr. Mondale accepted the request from the Wellstone family to run for Senate, it was a natural step for Tina to serve as campaign

manager.

Tina recalls that six-day campaign as a whirlwind of activity. "I went from having my cell phone ring one or two times an hour – usually from my kids – to answering it 40 to 50 times an hour with the frenzy of local and national press directed to me."

Tina expresses no regrets about being involved with the Mondale run, despite the difficulty of the task and the eventual outcome of the race. She continues her in-

volvement in the public arena in her month-old position at Planned Parenthood of Minnesota/South Dakota as Vice President of Marketing and Public Affairs. In this position, she hopes to work for the prevention of unwanted pregnancies in what she describes as challenging times ahead for women's healthcare.

And Why Fulton?

Tina and her family moved into Fulton neighborhood from St. Louis Park in 1996 to gain the benefits of city life—easy access to downtown; walking to local retail sites like the neighborhood coffee shop, butcher shop and co-op; and friendly, organized neighborhoods.

"With homemade ice cream and badminton in the street," says Tina, "our annual block party the weekend before Memorial Day helped me get to know my neighbors." These neighborly connections have helped make Fulton a place the Smith family plans to remain into the future. (The rosemary potatoes at Zumbro's, she adds, keep her here as well.)

Southwest Technology Lab Open to Neighbors

Southwest Community Education has a "State-of-the-art" PC Computer lab for neighbors to use.

When is it open? The Lab is open on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday evenings, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., (*excluding Holidays and school vacations*). The winter dates for the lab will be from Monday, January 27, to Thursday, March 20th, and Spring Quarter, from April 7th to May 29th.

What does it cost to use it? The cost of using the lab is \$3.00 per hour (this includes \$.25 worth of printing), or you can buy a 10-hour punch card that includes \$3.00 worth of printing expenses (black & white prints are .05, and color prints are \$.50).

How do I arrange lab time? Please note: You MUST call ahead of time to reserve a computer for yourself. You cannot be guaranteed a spot if you don't call ahead.

City News What's Happening in Minneapolis that Neighbors Need to Know?

City Council Passes 5-Year Budget Direction—Prepares for Cuts in State Aid

The Minneapolis City Council approved a measure establishing a Five-Year Financial Direction for the City. This Financial Direction, which was supported by Mayor R.T. Rybak, provides City departments with a clear picture of the level of financial resources that will be available over the next five years. This information allows departments to be more innovative and do effective planning. Essentially, this proposal will be a road map for how the City cuts \$55 million from its budget over the next five years.

The City of Minneapolis anticipates a \$55 million gap between revenue and expenses over the next five years (2004-2008), based on the Five-Year Financial Forecast. City leaders will take additional steps in the coming weeks and months to cut spending and bridge that gap.

In mid-January, the Minneapolis City Council approved a resolution that sets a ceiling for employee annual wage increases at two percent for all future labor contracts. The measure, which was supported by Mayor R.T. Rybak, could save the City \$35 million in future wages through 2008.

Adopted. Yeas, 8; Nays, 4. Council passed on Jan. 31, 2003 February 6, 2003, R.T. Rybak, Mayor
